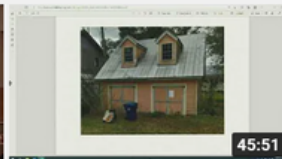

A MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN CLERK JANET DUFRENE

Happy Fall Ya'll and welcome to our 2nd edition of the Live Oak Journal. Hopefully, this edition gives you a glance to the past while also educating you on the process for participating in the election process in Abita Springs. Abita has a long history of community engagement and fighting for the unique character and community we enjoy. November 8th is election day and Abita Springs voters will be casting their ballots for School Board Representative, Mayor, Board of Alderman (5), US Congressman, US Senator, and several constitutional amendments. Casting your vote is the most important way to get involved in your town.

We have been working hard on comprehensive zoning and a path towards a master plan. We are excited about the possibility of making real changes to the current zoning ordinances that align with the future our community collectively envisions for our town. Abita Springs has a long history of inviting people to visit and welcoming them as one of us. We enjoy live music, art, festivals and beer with our friends. Our goal is to move forward with ordinance revisions that further those goals.

The town playground has been a focus for our public works department over the past few months. We have completed repairs and replacement of some of the equipment. The two bridges have been rebuilt, the slide has been ordered to replace the broken triple slide, the tires have been refurbished and the fence around the playground has been removed. We are having the fence around the playground replaced through a donation from Abita Fall Fest. We have stored the old fence with the pickets that were hand painted by sponsors in the community. We will be seeking ideas from the community for an art exhibit for the park using the old pickets. We will be moving the River Shelter that is closest to the Abita River up some to prevent further erosion of the slab that is getting very close to collapsing into the river. We have replaced the railings on the Trailhead Museum and will be looking at options for the fencing surrounding the promenade area that includes the pavilion and museum. Finally, we are working with the contractor of the splash pad to get it resurfaced.

The town is actively working to capture some of the history of Abita Springs. If any of our local families have items they would be willing to share with us we could scan or photograph them and return the originals. We have been working on an archive with the Trailhead Museum and documents and photos from the early days of Abita Springs are being sought. Please reach out to me if you have anything you would be willing to share. Our hope is to retain our history while working towards the future.

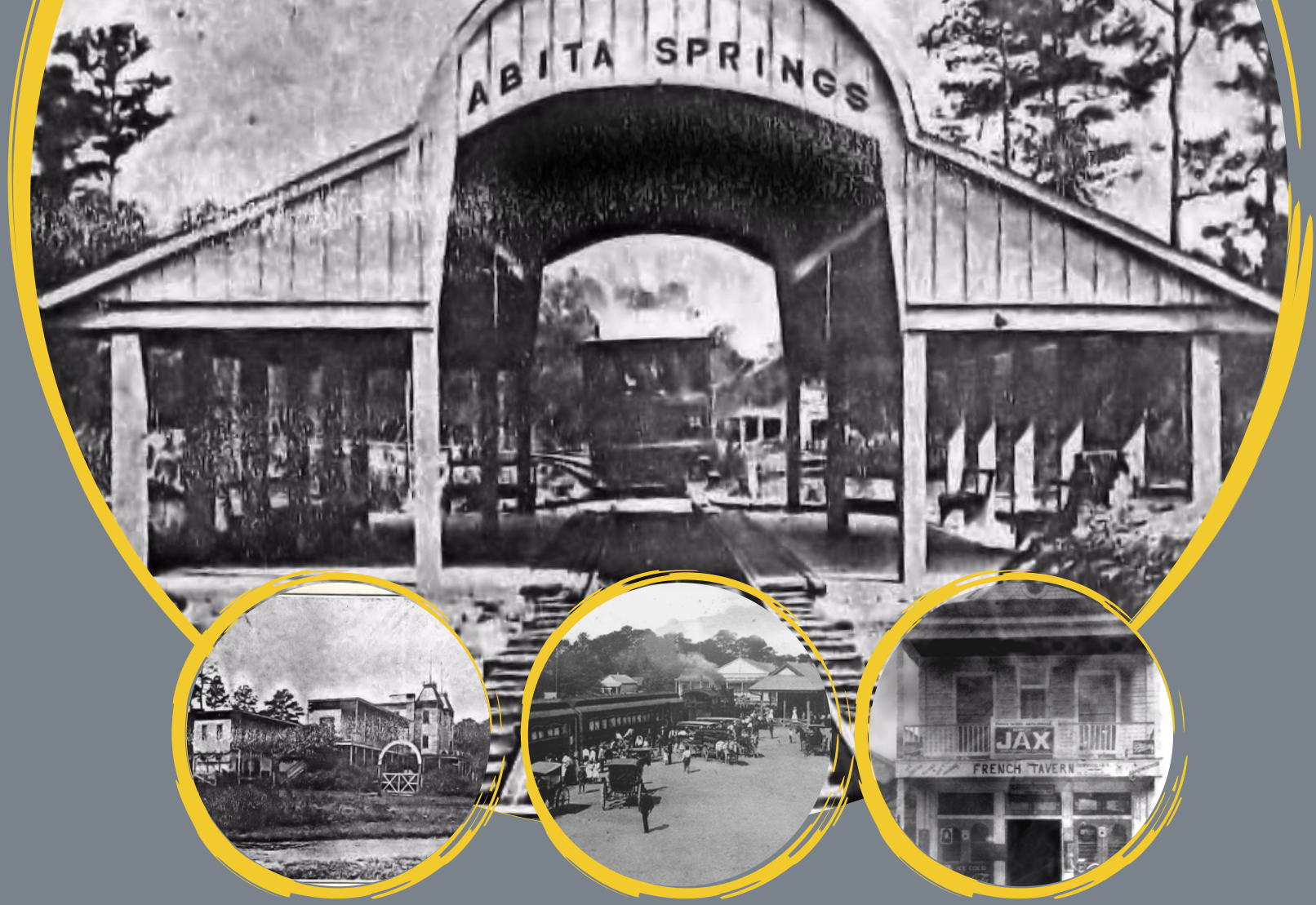

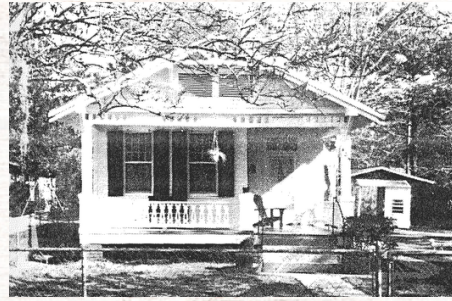

In 1913, a young lady named Mathilda Emily Balser traveled from New Orleans to spend a week in Abita Springs. She met Edward Strain who worked with his dad, George, at their general merchandise store located on the corner of Laurel & Main Street. She came for a week, fell in love, married, and stayed a lifetime.

Edward, Mathilda, and Arnold were living in their new Live Oak home in 1921 when Mathilda gave birth to a daughter, Marie.

In 1928, Marie died at seven years old from tetanus after a fall on gravel on Live Oak Street. Doctors did everything they could to save her. Edward and Mathilda never had any more children. Homes are filled with both happiness and sadness.

Time passed and the house bustled with everyday life, again. There were chickens, clotheslines, an outdoor kitchen for cooking pears, and a garage with a lean-to outdoor shower for Arnold and his cousin, Bertrand, to use after swimming in the Abita River. On weekday afternoons, Tillie's neighbors would drop by for homemade layer

cake with vanilla icing and coffee. Their home was an inviting place in the middle of a wonderful Abita neighborhood where everyone helped one another. On Friday nights, the family sat on the front porch and played Bingo because they could hear the numbers being called from the open windows at the Abita Town Hall.

Best of all, Tillie loved Sunday afternoons when her aunts and uncles from New Orleans drove over to Abita. Their car arrived filled with McKenzie's éclairs and cream puffs. Paperwhite narcissus bloomed along the sidewalk, grandchildren played in the front yard, and Tillie caught up on all the New

Orleans news. Southern hospitality and laughter happened on the porch at Live Oak Street on Sundays.

After her family left on Sunday evening to return to New Orleans, Tillie sat quietly on the front porch in the glider, nearby wisteria fragrance filled the air, and she read the next chapter in her library book.

In 2019, the grandchildren, Brenda Lanier and Ruth Prats, sold Live Oak to Mr. Bill Hawayek, the perfect new owner. Over the next two years, he embarked on a labor of love to painstakingly and to completely bring his home into the 21st century while preserving all the historical elements of the past. Today, it is truly an Abita home for the next 100 years with new memories to share on the front porch.

When you pass by 72082 Live Oak Street, glance over and smile at Bill's beautifully restored home... a precious "jewel" in Abita Springs. He knows in his heart that Tillie approves.

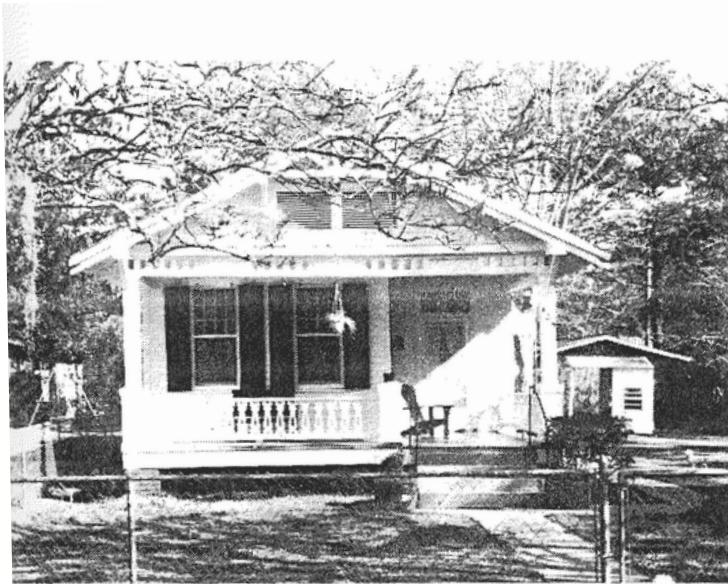

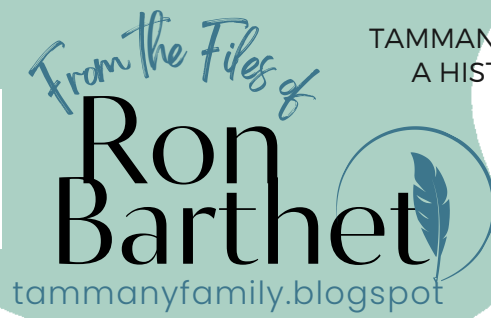

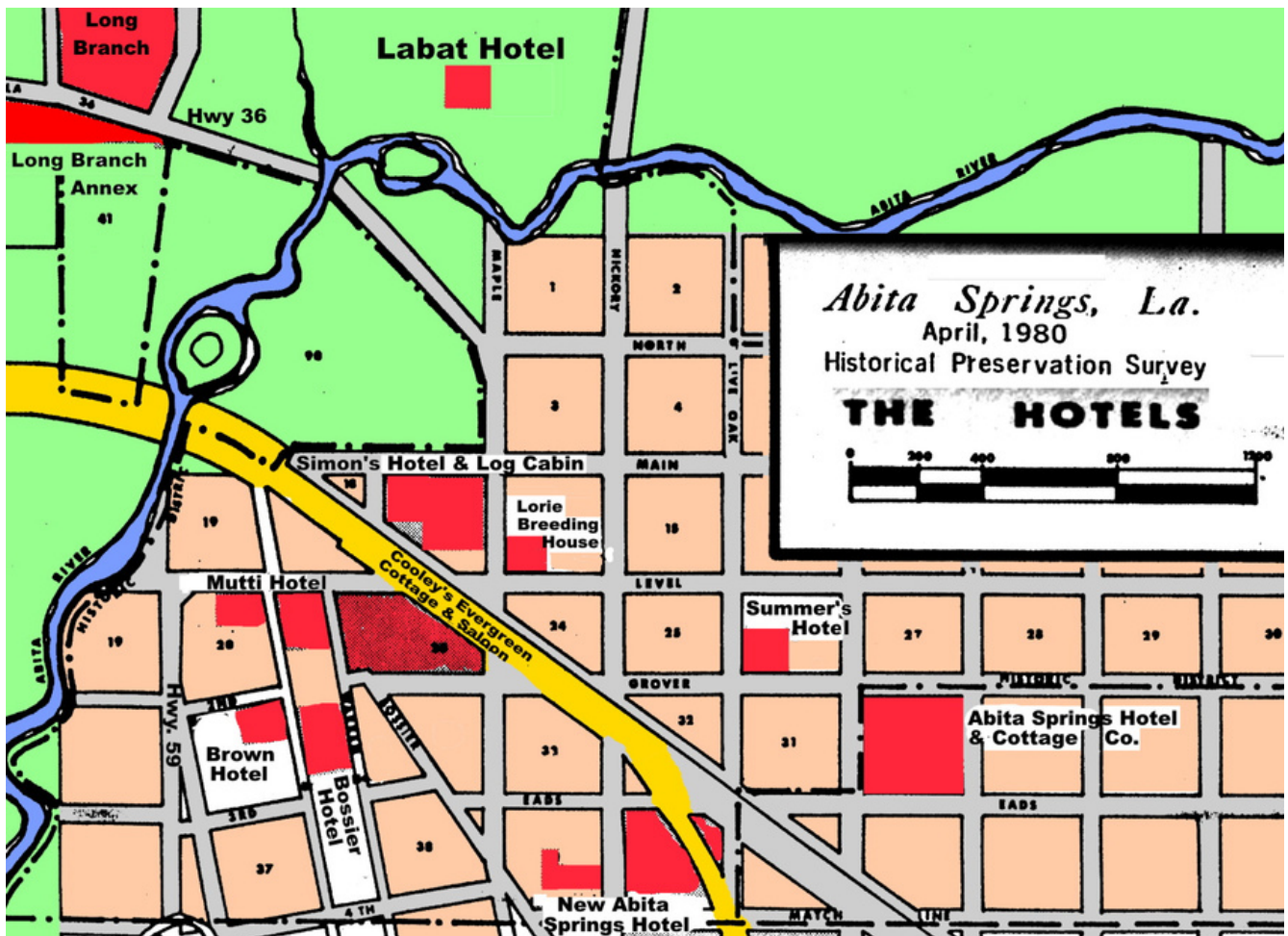




A HISTORY OF ABITA SPRINGS HOTELS

In 1980 a historical preservation survey of Abita Springs included a map of the several hotels that were located in the town in the early 1900's. Below is the map, with slight graphic improvements.

The Simon's Hotel opened on August 14, 1887, "offering visitors a French kitchen with Parisian style cooking. By late 1888 hotels included the Bossier House, Labat's Hotel, the Long Branch and Simon's.

The report states that "in January 1891, the fine cottage of Gustave Martin and the unfinished two story hotel building of Matthew Brown were entirely consumed by fire." Later in the year, fire destroyed the newly built Bossier Hotel.

By 1892, local newspapers were noting that Abita Springs had hotels named Moran's Hotel, Martin's Hotel, Summer's Hotel, Bossier's Hotel, Labat's Hotel, Long Branch and Simon's, in addition to the "rumor" of the Great Northern Hotel.

"In 1895, there is mention of the Gem Hotel owned by Rose Martin and A.A. Cooley's Evergreen Cottage," the preservation survey stated. "In April of 1898 the Abita Springs Hotel was opened with Widow O. Aubert being the proprietress."

The Abita Springs Hotel burned in 1900 and was rebuilt with steam heat to accommodate year-round visitors.

In 1903 the Mutti Hotel was named in the local newspapers, along with Duqusne Cottage, Ozone Cottage Company, Strain's Cottage, and Spring View Cottage.

ABITA HOTEL MAN MAKING IMPROVEMENTS.

Mr. Alexander Mutti, who owns several hotels in Abita Springs, is preparing for a good season for next year. He is building four cottages at the Abita Springs Hotel and is building three others nearby. Two cottages he is building near the Catholic church will be modernly equipped family residences with all the conveniences that are attractive to the city man who spends the season at Abita. The hotel improvements will make accommodations for quite an increased number of guests.

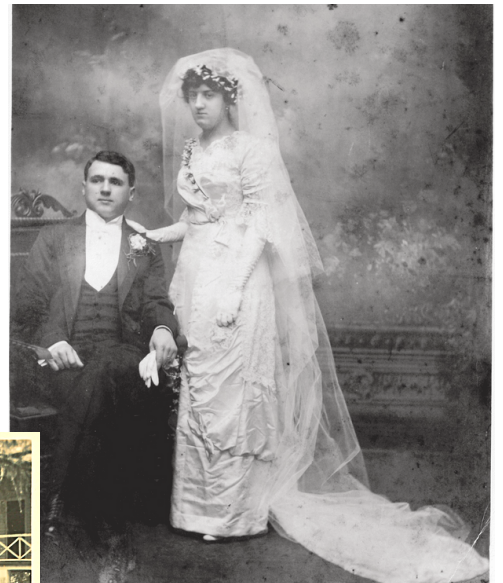
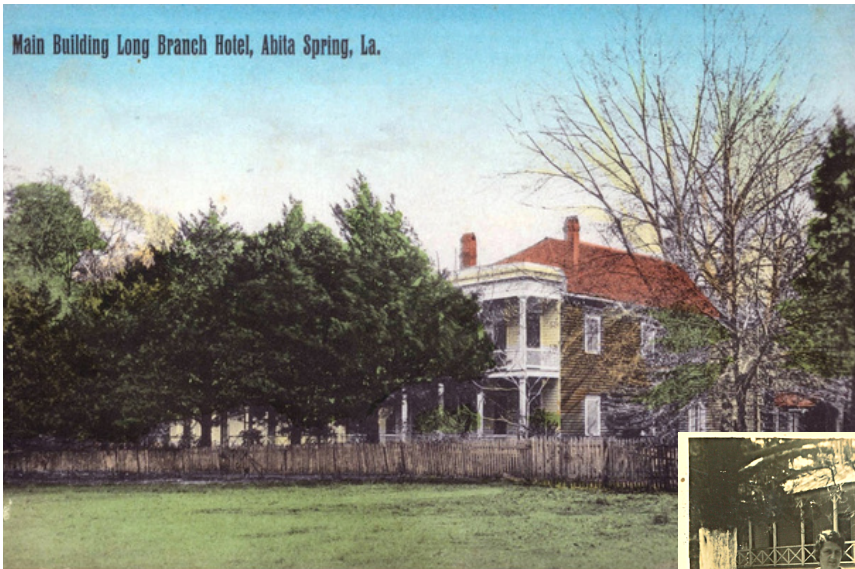
"Many fine hotels and cottages were established in Abita Springs due to its development as a major resort center," the preservation survey explained. "The larger hotels such as the Bossier House, Labat's, Mutti, Simon's, Long Branch, Abita Springs Hotel and Cottage Company, New Abita Springs Hotel and the Ozone Belt Hotel and Cottages consisted of a main building with several 'bachelor' and 'family' cottages. "



"These hotels were very well patronized at a time when Abita Springs was at its height of popularity. Accommodations for some two thousand guests were available in Abita at its zenith.

"In addition to the hotels, several houses and cottages were established to accommodate summer visitors. Lorio, Barclay, Morin, Martin's, and Strain Cottages to name a few all offered room and board to weekend and summer visitors. "

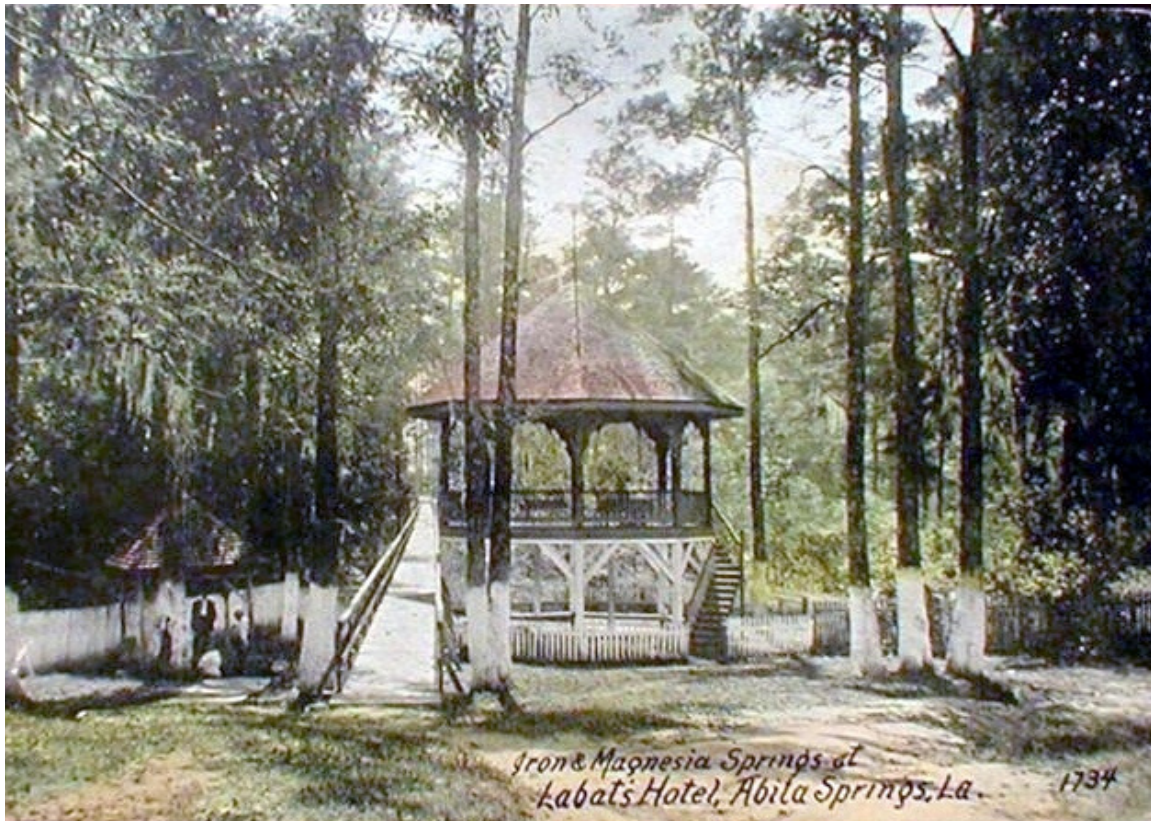
The survey went on to describe the extensive gardens that surrounded some of the Abita hotels, gardens of which much of the landscaping and plantings still existed in 1980, when the survey was written.

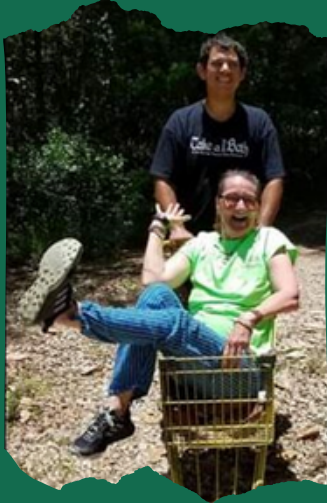

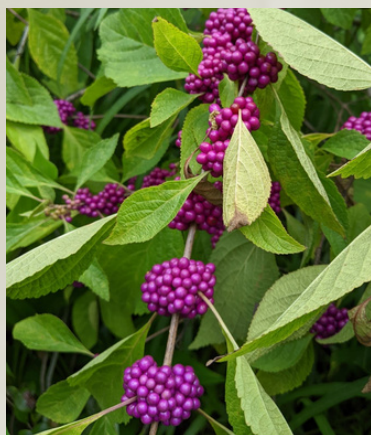

AMERICAN BEAUTYBERRY OR FRENCH MULBERRY

(*Callicarpa americana*)

Location in town: Tammany Trace

Average Size: 6'-8' x 6'

Beautyberries are native deciduous shrubs that grow well in full sun or part shade in slightly acidic soils. Shrubs have 3" to 6" yellow green leaves, small light pink flowers that bloom in summer & transform into clusters of purple berries that provide food for wildlife from Aug. - Nov.



BALD CYPRESS

(*Taxodium distichum*) Louisiana State Tree

Average Size: 50' x 25'

Bald Cypress are deciduous trees that provide stabilization near water edges and resist strong winds. Trees have delicate fern like leaves that change from green to brown in autumn. Bald Cypress can produce knees when growing in wet soils.



FEATURED GARDEN PRODUCTS:

RAIN CHAINS & BARRELS

Use an historic half-round gutter, copper rain chain, and a rain barrel to direct water away from your house or outbuilding. Rain barrels have been used to collect rain for more than 2,000 years. Use this water to water your plants.

How much water can you collect? If your house is 1,000 square feet and 1" of rain falls, you can collect up to 600 gallons of rainwater! Many people connect multiple rain barrels to capture more of the water.

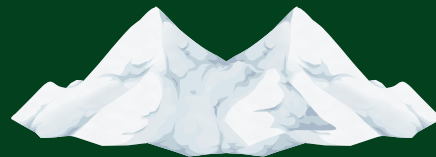

SPOTLIGHT ON GALLO D'ORO FARM



History of Our Farm

Gallo D'Oro Farm was founded in 2005 by Dan and Shantell Rinderle. The farm name comes from Shantell's side of the family. Shantell is pure Italian with both parents being descendants of migrants from Italy. Her maiden name is Gallodoro which directly translates to 'Golden Rooster' or Gallo D'Oro meaning rooster of gold. Her great grandparents owned Gallodoro's Grocery in New Orleans back when bread was 15 cents a loaf. You could also pick out a live chicken and Giuseppe Gallodoro would fully dress it out for you for the high price of 35 cents.

Shantell grew up raising birds in Violet, Louisiana with her father. Dan grew up gardening and fishing with his father in River Ridge, Louisiana. It wasn't a stretch to combine those two activities with chickens and a large crop area once they were married in 2004. It all started with one chicken, "Gallina", translating to 'hen' in Italian, and a small 16x20 garden. You'll find Gallina featured in their logo. Since that time, they've added goats, sheep, and mini donkeys to their five-acre farm.

Dan likes to say "Nothing can replace what is passed down from generation to generation. No book can help you grow crops or raise livestock like first hand experience from your parents."

Our Farm Today



Much of the produce grown on the farm has been passed down as heirlooms from Dan's father, dating back some 50 years. Every year seeds are cultivated from their pesticide and herbicide free crops to re-plant the following year.

For a long time, they gave away veggies to friends and neighbors in abundance and eventually got into pressure canning. Christmas presents would consist of dilly beans or pickled okra many years. When they couldn't give it all away, they decided to try their hand at the Abita Springs Art and Farmer's Market, at first just for fun with the market being literally five minutes from the farm. Eventually, they found that it would help pay for farm expenses so now it is part of their everyday routine.

"We strive to be innovators as well as sparing no expense when it comes to the quality and freshness of our products" Dan said.

They feature farm fresh eggs, fresh produce in season, canned freshly grown vegetables, pepper jellies, as well as a line of pickle shots, freshly grown and pickled snack packs, infused olive and avocado oils and a line of salad dressings that is up to 28 flavors including dairy free options of Caesar, Ranch, Bleu Cheese, Creamy Italian, & French.



FUN FACT:
Their pickled items made it onto the big screen on the shelf in the little store in the movie, *Where the Crawdads Sing*, filmed locally here in Louisiana!



Abita Springs Art & Farmers Market



Both Dan and Shantell have backgrounds in sales. Shantell worked at her real job in banking before retiring in 2020. Dan has a degree in marketing and has been in lubricant sales at his real job for 25 years with Certified Laboratories.

"It doesn't matter what you are selling, you ultimately are selling yourself." You can see the marketing efforts in the packaging of their products. People ultimately buy from people they like. And then a nice clean, presentable, and delicious product goes a long way.

They use their produce from their farm in all of their products as much as possible. Their products are seasonal and therefore do run out from time to time. Rest assured, everything you purchase from Gallo D'Oro Farm is farm to table to the fullest extent!

You can catch Gallo D'Oro Farm at the Abita Springs Art & Farmer's Market every Sunday just to the west side of the stage right next to the food trucks & gravel circle. They are very approachable and are always willing to share a story or a pointer or two for growing a local crop. So make sure and stop by to chat!

In addition to the farm and product line, Shantell created a way to show off her culinary creativity through her latest venture, Gallo D'Oro's Taste of Italy. You can catch her cooking up some of their greatest hits off of the farm in the form of Italian dishes at the Abita Springs Art & Farmer's Market, too!

The Family Tradition Continues!

The tradition continues through their daughter Jennifer's newest venture, La Cucina Di Yanna. You can catch Jennifer every Sunday right next to Gallo D'Oro Farm and Taste of Italy at the Abita Springs Art & Farmer's Market. She sells her signature stuffed breads including spinach & artichoke dipped in garlic butter sauce. To wash it down, she has several flavors of what else? Italian Sodas!

La Cucia Di Yanna, you might ask? It literally means Yanna's Kitchen. Yanna? Her daughters are Brianna and Lilyanna who Dan affectionately calls 'Big Yanna' and 'Lil Yanna'. The name just kind of fell into place. Both girls are on their way to great things too! You can catch some of their baked goods in Jennifer's booth on Sundays (when the homework is light).

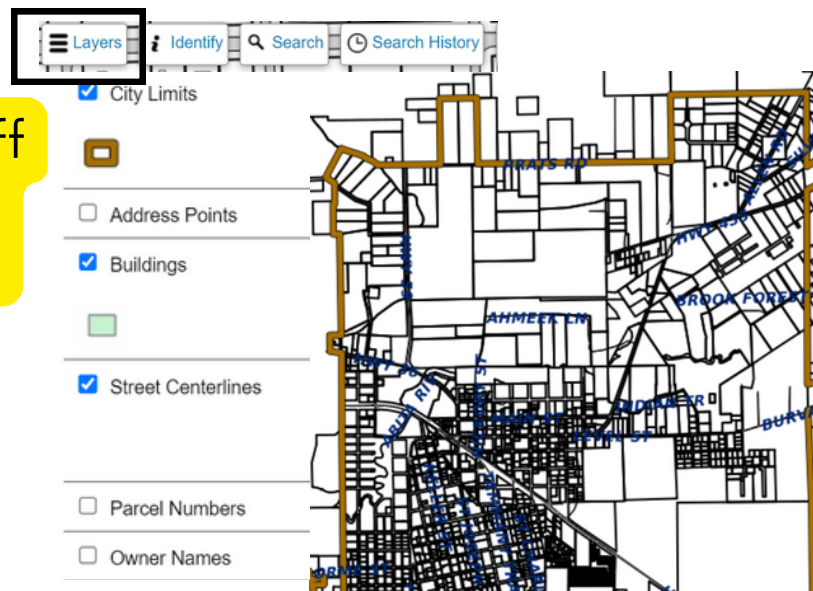
GIS ZONING MAP



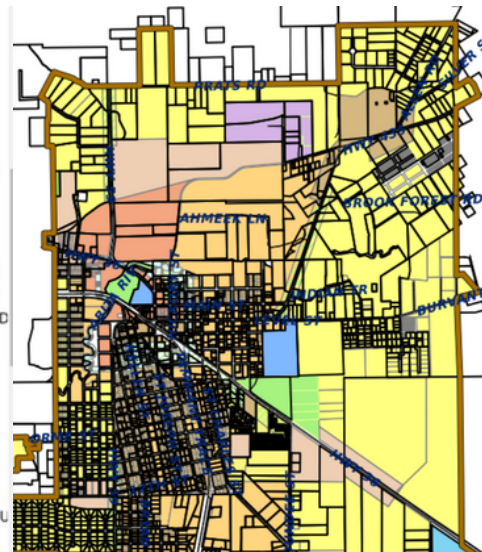

IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

From the Public Works Maintenance Department

YOU CAN HELP: TIPS TO REDUCE FLOODING



When it rains, ditches and culverts help to keep Town neighborhoods from flooding. When leaves collect in gutters and block these drains, water can back up and cause ponding that slows or stops traffic and can even flood yards and homes. **While autumn is when leaves are most likely to collect in drains, it can happen at any time of the year.** (Although it's usually not until Winter in South Louisiana)

Our drainage crews work hard to maintain all of the Town's drainage infrastructure, including storm drains on streets. But with hundreds of drains spread all across the Town, we need your help too. You can help prevent flooding by paying attention to what's happening with the drains on your block. A few small maintenance actions on your property can also prevent stormwater from ponding.

KEEP LEAVES AND DEBRIS OUT OF DRAINS

- Avoid piling yard waste like fallen leaves and sticks in your yard, where it could wash into ditches or town drains.
- Use a rake or broom to remove leaves and debris from the tops of storm drains.
- If the drain is still clogged after you've removed the debris, report to the town. (see how below)
- If an inlet or street drain appears to be blocked by debris, try to safely clear a channel to provide a path for the runoff. If the drain cannot be cleared, or if the cause of the blockage or flooding is uncertain, fill out a work order on our website.

RESPECT THE TOWN'S DRAINAGE SYSTEM

- Don't put grass clippings, leaves or other debris into any of the drains, ditches, creeks, or culverts in the Town.
- Do not store furniture or other items like firewood, fuel tanks, containers and loose items in your yard, as floodwaters can wash these items into culverts and cause flooding and or contamination.
- Collect water in rain barrels and cisterns.
- Create rain gardens. A rain garden acts like a native forest by collecting, absorbing, and filtering stormwater runoff from rooftops, driveways, patios, and other areas that don't allow water to soak in.

What is Carbon Monoxide?

Carbon monoxide, or "CO," is an odorless, colorless gas that can kill you.



Where is CO found?

CO is found in fumes produced any time you burn fuel in cars or trucks, small engines, stoves, lanterns, grills, fireplaces, gas ranges, or furnaces. CO can build up indoors and poison people and animals who breathe it.



Who is at risk from CO poisoning?

Everyone is at risk for CO poisoning. Infants, the elderly, people with chronic heart disease, anemia, or breathing problems are more likely to get sick from CO.

HOW CAN I PREVENT CO POISONING IN MY HOME?

- **Install a battery-operated or battery back-up CO detector in your home.** Check or replace the detector's battery when you change the time on your clocks each spring and fall. Place your detector where it will wake you up if it alarms, such as outside your bedroom. Consider buying a detector with a digital readout. This detector can tell you the highest level of CO concentration in your home in addition to alarming. Replace your CO detector every 5 years.
- Have your heating system, water heater, and any other gas, oil, or coal burning appliances serviced by a qualified technician every year.
- Make sure your gas appliances are vented properly.
- Have your chimney checked or cleaned every year. Chimneys can be blocked by debris and cause CO to build up inside your home or cabin.
- Never use a gas range or oven for heating. This can cause a build up of CO inside your home.
- Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal gives off CO.
- Never use a portable gas camp stove indoors. This can cause CO to build up inside your home.
- Never use a generator inside your home, or garage or less than 20' from any window, door, or vent.
- When using a generator, use a battery-powered or battery backup CO detector in your home.



WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF CO POISONING?

The most common symptoms of CO poisoning are **headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion.** CO symptoms are often described as "flu-like." If you breathe in a lot of CO it can make you pass out or kill you. **People who are sleeping or drunk can die from CO poisoning before they have symptoms.**

WINTER PREPARATION

TOP 10 WAYS TO PROTECT YOUR HOME DURING A FREEZE

COVER OUTDOOR SPIGOTS

Spigots are directly exposed to freezing temperatures. They often are the first thing to freeze up on a house. Protecting them is easy and cheap. Insulated covers are usually under \$10 and can be purchased at local stores.

PROTECT YOUR WATER LINES

You can wrap exposed pipes with insulation pipe wraps or use old towels around your house and wrap with duct tape!

SEAL CRACKS AND HOLES

Check the outside of your home for small cracks or openings. Even small holes where cables enter your home can allow cold air inside. Spray foam insulation can be used to close these up quickly.

KEEP WATER FLOWING

When temperatures dip well below freezing, if any of your plumbing is near an exterior wall, you should drip your lines. You may also consider leaving your cabinet doors open so the pipes inside will be warmed by your room air.

ENSURE EASY ACCESS TO WATER SHUT OFF

If your water lines do burst you will need to shut off the home's water supply immediately. If you have anything in the way of getting to this valve, we recommend clearing this for easy and quick access. This is normally a job for a professional plumber, but can save your home and property from further damage.

CLOSE GARAGE DOORS

If your garage is attached to your home keeping the door closed will help keep cold air out and can protect plumbing fixtures in your garage.

CLEAN GUTTERS

Having full gutters can increase your chance of having ice form on your roof. This is not something that you want. We recommend setting aside time to clean your gutters out before freezing temperatures arrive.

PREPARE FOR VACATION

When you leave your home for an extended period of time during the winter consider shutting off your water at the water meter and draining your plumbing system. This will help you not to worry as much about freezing pipes or other plumbing failures.

NOW IS A GOOD TIME TO GET READY FOR WINTER



WINTER WEATHER TERMINOLOGY

Familiarize yourself with these terms to help identify a winter hazard:

- **Freezing Rain** - Rain that freezes when it hits the ground, creating a coating of ice on roads, walkways, trees, and power lines.
- **Sleet** - Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet also causes moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.
- **Winter Weather Advisory** - Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life-threatening.

HAZARDS OF SPACE HEATERS

Extreme cold also significantly increases the risks of household fires due to the use of fireplaces and space heaters. Here are some tips for safely use space heaters:

Make Sure to Follow These Important Tips Before You Plug In

PLACE space heaters on a flat, level surface, away from high-traffic areas.

PLUG a space heater directly into an outlet and avoid using an extension cord.

NEVER LEAVE space heaters unattended.

ONLY USE space heaters with the certification label of a nationally recognized testing lab.

DON'T USE a space heater if the plug is broken or the cord is frayed, worn or damaged.

Four Home Heating Tips to Live By

- 1** **KEEP ANYTHING THAT CAN BURN** at least three feet away from a heating source. **3ft**
- 2** **HAVE YOUR HEATING SYSTEM** inspected annually.
- 3** **KEEP VENTS CLEAR** of dust and debris.
- 4** **INSTALL CARBON MONOXIDE (CO)** alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A PHONE SCAM

THERE IS NO PRIZE

The caller might say you were “selected” for an offer or that you’ve won a lottery. There is no Prize.



YOU WON'T BE ARRESTED

Scammers might pretend to be law enforcement or a federal agency. Real law enforcement and federal agencies won't call and threaten you.

YOU DON'T NEED TO DECIDE NOW

Most legitimate businesses will give you time to think their offer over and get written information. Take your time. Don't get pressured into making a decision on the spot.

THERE'S NEVER A GOOD REASON TO SEND CASH OR PAY WITH A GIFT CARD

Scammers will often ask you to pay in a way that makes it hard for you to get your money back — by wiring money, putting money on a gift card, prepaid card or cash reload card, or using a money transfer app. **Anyone who asks you to pay that way is a scammer.**

GOVERNMENT AGENCIES WON'T CALL TO CONFIRM YOUR SENSITIVE INFORMATION

It's never a good idea to give out sensitive information like your Social Security number to someone who calls you.

YOU SHOULDN'T BE GETTING ALL THOSE CALLS

If you're on the National Do Not Call Registry, you shouldn't get live sales calls from companies you haven't done business with before. Those calls are illegal. If someone is already breaking the law calling you, there's a good chance it's a scam.

EXAMPLES OF COMMON PHONE SCAMS

Any scam can happen over the phone. Here are some common angles phone scammers use:

IMPOSTER SCAMS

A scammer pretends to be someone you trust — a government agency like the Social Security Administration or the IRS, a family member, a love interest, or someone claiming there's a problem with your computer. The scammer can even have a fake name or number show up on your caller ID to convince you.

DEBT RELIEF AND CREDIT REPAIR SCAMS

Scammers will offer to lower your credit card interest rates, fix your credit, or get your student loans forgiven if you pay their company a fee first.



IF YOU OWN A PHONE READ THIS.

EXAMPLES OF COMMON PHONE SCAMS

BUSINESS AND INVESTMENT SCAMS

Callers might promise to help you start your own business and give you business coaching, or guarantee big profits from an investment. Don't take their word for it.

CHARITY SCAMS

Scammers like to pose as charities. Scams requesting donations for disaster relief efforts are especially common. Always check out a charity before you give..

EXTENDED CAR WARRANTIES

Scammers find out what kind of car you drive and when you bought it so they can urge you to buy overpriced — or worthless — service contracts.

"FREE" TRIALS

A caller might promise a free trial but then sign you up for products — sometimes lots of products — that you're billed for every month until you cancel.

LOAN SCAMS

Loan scams include advance fee loan scams, where scammers target people with a poor credit history and guarantee loans or credit cards for an up-front fee.

PRIZE AND LOTTERY SCAMS

In a typical prize scam, the caller will say you've won a prize, but then say you need to pay taxes, registration fees, or shipping charges to get it. But after you pay, you find out there is no prize.

TRAVEL SCAMS AND TIMESHARE SCAMS

Scammers promise free or low-cost vacations that can end up costing you a lot in hidden costs. And sometimes, after you pay, you find out there is no vacation.

SPAM TEXT MESSAGES AND PHISHING

Scammers send fake text messages to trick you into giving them your personal information -things like your password, account number, or Social Security number. If they get that information, they could gain access to your email, bank, or other accounts. Or they could sell your information to other scammers.

SCAMMERS OFTEN TRY TO GET YOU TO CLICK ON LINKS IN TEXT MESSAGES BY PROMISING YOU SOMETHING. SCAMMERS MIGHT:

- promise free prizes, gift cards, or coupons — **but they're not real**
- offer you a low or no interest credit card — **but there's no deal and probably no card**
- promise to help you pay off your student loans — **but they won't**
- send messages that say they have info. about your account or a transaction. - **but they don't**
- say they've noticed some suspicious activity on your account — **but they haven't**
- claim there's a problem with your payment information — **but there isn't**
- send a fake invoice and tell you to contact them if you didn't authorize a purchase-**but it's a scam**
- send you a package delivery notification — **but it's fake.**

DETECTING A NATURAL GAS LEAK USING YOUR SENSES

KNOW THE SIGNS. DISCUSS THIS WITH YOUR FAMILY

SMELL

NATURAL GAS DOESN'T HAVE AN ODOR, SO YOU CAN'T RELY ON YOUR SENSE OF SMELL ALONE TO DETECT IT.

The Town of Abita Springs Gas Department has taken steps to protect customers from natural gas leaks by adding an **odorant**, called **mercaptan**, that smells like **rotting eggs or an unpleasant skunk smell**.



SIGHT

Natural gas may blow dirt, make bubbles, kill vegetation or create an area of frost on the ground in warm weather when it leaks from an underground pipe.



SOUND

A natural gas leak can be a quiet hiss or a loud roar.



3 STEPS TO TAKE IF YOU SUSPECT A GAS LEAK

- Do not attempt to locate the leak. Leave the area immediately and do not touch anything that could cause a spark.
- Call the Town of Abita Springs (985) 892-0711 and 911 from another location at a safe distance.
- The Town of Abita Springs Gas Department will investigate the situation at no cost. Do not re-enter the area until you have been advised that it is safe.

HEALTH

Symptoms of a natural gas leak include headache, dizziness, loss of coordination, irritation, drowsiness, or unconsciousness. Extremely high concentrations of natural gas can cause suffocation from a lack of oxygen.

Open Congressional Primary Election:

- The deadline to register to vote in person, by mail or at the OMV Office is Oct. 11.
- The deadline to register to vote through the GeauxVote Online Registration System is Oct. 18.
- Early voting is Oct. 25 through Nov. 1 (excluding Sunday, Oct. 30) from 8:30 a.m.–6 p.m.
- The deadline to request an absentee ballot is Nov. 4 by 4:30 p.m (other than military and overseas voters). You can request an absentee ballot online through our Voter Portal or in writing through your Registrar of Voters Office.

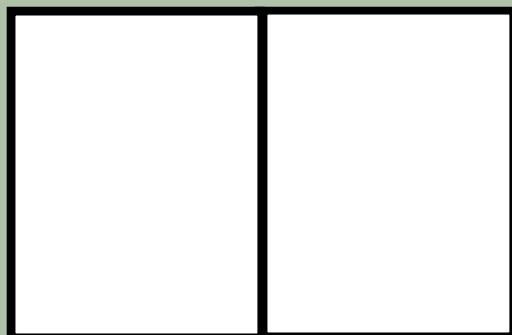

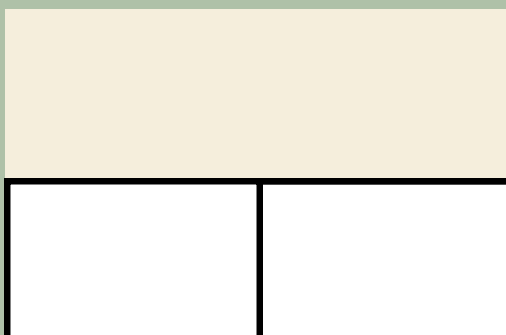
The following is my candidacy platform:
